Entries need to be submitted on paper by Monday 8<sup>th</sup> April. The Science Ambassador Team will judge the designs and one lucky winner from KS1 and KS2 will win a Science Investigation kit and receive a free family ticket to the Think Tank in Birmingham in association with the Royal Institution. We cannot wait to see your fantastic ideas!
